Lab Products Animal Technician Award

Benefits: (participation, recognition, public speaking, and decision making):

1. Allow a deserving animal care worker from each of the 8 AALAS Districts to attend a National AALAS Meeting for the first time.
2. Publicly recognize the recipient at a social function of the AALAS membership.
3. Encourage the recipient to speak at a Branch Meeting on their experiences at AALAS, thereby allowing them to gain experience in public speaking and to promote the AALAS experience to other technicians.
4. The recipient will serve as a member of the Lab Products Animal Technician Award Selection Committee for the next year. This will allow them the experience and involvement in a decision making process that will affect their peers.

Award Selection Committee:

1. Nominees for this years awards will be submitted to Lab Products, Inc. An Award Selection Committee will then consider all nominations and select one nominee from each of the 8 AALAS Districts to receive the award.
2. 2004 Award recipients will form the Award Selection Committee for selection of the 2005 Award Recipients.

Award Selection Criteria:

1. Nominee must have a minimum of 1 years work experience in a laboratory animal facility.
2. Nominee must be a working supervisor, animal care worker or animal health technician. (Managers, Assistant Directors, etc. are not eligible).
3. The nominee must be someone that actually performs hands on animal care work or works in the cage wash area.
4. The nominee must be someone that would not be eligible for travel funds (from the University, Institution or Company) to attend a National AALAS meeting.
5. This award is intended to provide deserving animal care technicians with the opportunity to attend their first National AALAS Meeting. Therefore, only nominees that have never attended a National AALAS Meeting will be eligible.

Nomination Process: (Nominations must be RECEIVED BY June 15, 2005)

1. Nominations are to be submitted by letter, detailing the Technicians' work history, accomplishments, community involvement, and describing how this travel award will benefit the technician and their facility. AALAS Branch membership, and involvement in branch AALAS activities, will be considered in the award selection.
2. Supporting letters are encouraged and will be considered, but are not required.

Abstract: This workshop is designed for those who are responsible for developing and maintaining Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) at animal care facilities. The workshop begins with an overview of SOP's and why writing effective SOP's is more important today than ever before. A basic SOP writing cycle will be introduced for managing an SOP development or upgrade effort. Techniques for interviewing and the use of mind mapping and flow-charting, as means of drafting SOP's will be discussed and practiced. Examples of effective action steps such as sentence structure, use of action verbs, and conditional steps will be presented and examples discussed. Then, using checklists and our collective experience, we'll evaluate sample SOP's. At the conclusion of this workshop, participants will have a greater appreciation for how properly developed and written SOP's can be used to effectively and efficiently manage and operate their facilities.

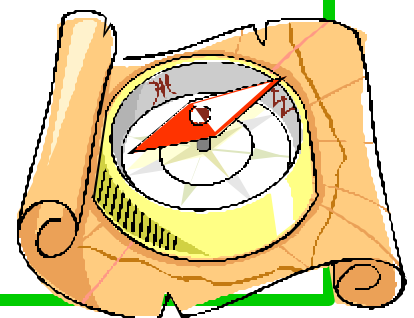

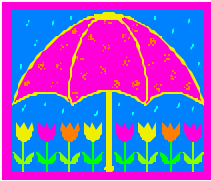

Board of Trustees Report

The AALAS Board of Trustees met on February 18-20, 2005 in St. Louis, MO for their Winter Session. The following items were discussed and approved at the meeting.

- Due to the success of the Certification Registry Reception at the National Meeting in Tampa the Certification and Registry Board will be holding another reception at the National Meeting in St. Louis. The CMAR Committee will be coordinating a reception for the over 100 CMAR-certified managers to be held at the same time as the CRB Reception. Remember that the Technician registry is now included in your membership fees so there is no additional fee to be part of the registry.
- A new editorial structure for the Comparative Medicine (CM) and Contemporary Topics (CT) journals was approved along with a new Editor, Dr. Linda Toth. Dr. Toth will have 2 associate editors, Dr. Ravi Tolwani for the CM journal and Dr. Susan Compton for the CT journal. A scientific review panel appointed by Dr. Toth will assist her in reviewing articles for the journals.
- The Trustees received a tour of the St. Louis Convention Center and were able to see a little of downtown St. Louis. All the hotels on the AALAS list are within 6 blocks of the Convention Center. The Renaissance Grand Hotel, the Renaissance Suites Hotel and the Holiday Inn Select are directly across from the Convention Center.
- The Job Analysis Survey will be posted on the AALAS web site (www.aalas.org) for input in late February. Please take the time to complete the survey. This helps AALAS to determine the needs of the membership.
- A Statement of Core Values for AALAS was written and approved and will be included in the AALAS Policies and Procedures Manual as a preamble to the Code of Ethics.
- The Scientific Advisory Committee prepared an AALAS Position Statement on the Use of Animals in Precollege Education, which also includes Recommendations on the Use of Animals in Science Fair projects. The complete document may be found on the AALAS web site.
- Additional funding was approved for upgrades to the computer server for the AALAS Learning Library to improve the speed of the system.
- Ms. Judy Grisamore, Associate Executive Director of AALAS and Chief Operating Officer of the AALAS Foundation will be leaving AALAS after 15 years of dedicated service to the organization due to her husband's job transfer.
